Stapleford Town Football Club - Our History

The gestation of Stapleford Town Football Club commenced at the turn of the millennium with the formation of Stapleford Villa Football Club in 2002.

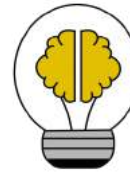
The vision at the heart of Stapleford Villa's football activities was the desire to provide and expand football facilities for youth and local residents of all ages with "Hickings Lane", the clubs home ground, supplying a base where players' love for the game of football could be rekindled, developed and expanded.

After early successes the club declined due to a lack of professional management resources.

In 2012 a core group consisting of some members of the previous management team and a group of supporters from the community in Stapleford, including parents, young people, local businesses and football enthusiasts, came together to relaunch the Club now known as Stapleford Town FC.

The management team of the relaunched Stapleford Town FC were determined that the Club be a grassroots community based club with an emphasis on providing a safe football facility that was welcoming to all; regardless of age, ability, personal or financial background meeting the criteria set out by the Football Association's concept of the beautiful game "for anyone, anytime, anywhere". In other words: For All.

From the very beginning the Club has recognised that to be a true community based club our activities would require a wide remit and so has developed not just the game of football but also the social aspects of the Club drawing in the wider community through events such as community fun days, participation in national events (such as RBL Poppy Appeal) and local events such as The "Hemlock Happening,"

Stapleford Town Football Club - Our History

Since our inception in 2013 we have expanded our activities building from three to thirty teams with 450 registered players.

To support the expansion of the Club and develop the potential of the players there are 51 FA registered coaches of which 31 are fully qualified and 10 are awaiting qualification through the Football Association Coaching scheme.

In 2016 the Club successfully applied to Broxtowe Borough Council for a Preferential User Agreement for football on the site at Hickings Lane Recreation Ground. Preferential User status provides the Club with priority access to the football facilities throughout the football season.

Also In 2016, a decision was made to form our senior section and after discussions with Ryan Stark and Matt Moody, a team was entered for the 2017/18 season. Using their extensive knowledge of local football and the wealth of players who, although lived in Stapleford, played football outside of the town a team was formed. We also recruited rookie manager Adam 'Lefty' Campbell and managed to successfully navigate our way to an NSL Div 1 title and Notts Junior Cup double in the first season. The following year we completed an astonishing back to back championship win lifting the Premier League at the first attempt.

The defence of the league title was curtailed by the Global Covid Pandemic and as restrictions eased the club regrouped and with a new management team of Tristram Whitman, Danny Arnold and Jordan Hunter who look to take the club forward, A healthy 2nd place finish in the 21/22 season demonstrates the club is both still competitive and also still developing players to come through.

Community hub and young people's centre

Plans have been proposed for a new £6.4million community centre that is aiming to become the "heart" of Stapleford. The project would transform the changing pavilion on Hickings Lane Recreation Ground, Stapleford, into a multi-million pound community and young people's centre.

The community leisure hub, planned by Broxtowe Borough Council, would host a range of community activities such as fitness classes, yoga, dancing, club groups, elections, meetings and event hire. A young people's centre, which would include a play area, would replace the existing young people's centre in Stapleford.

Nottinghamshire County Council's youth service would provide social and recreational activities at the site, and post-16 learning would also be delivered by Inspire. The existing redundant clubhouse will be demolished and replaced with a combination of grass and planting, with the number of car parking spaces increased.

The building will also facilitate Stapleford Town Football Club, which has supported the proposed full-size 3G pitch. Applicant Broxtowe Borough Council said the "state-of-the-art, accessible, energy-efficient multi-use building" is expected to be open by 2025.

This project is one of six regeneration projects funded through the £21.1m Stapleford Towns Fund, gained through Broxtowe Borough Council's successful bid to the Government's Towns Deal fund. A public consultation event will be held in spring for people to speak to the developers and input into the project.

Paul Sweeney, vice-chair of the Stapleford Towns Fund, said: "People told us they wanted a place to be able to meet for activities and events, and better facilities that help them to live healthier and more active lives. The new centre will really deliver this, and become the heart of our community, bringing people together in a building that will stand the test of time for generations to come."

Two Hands, Two Feet and 100 jobs!

Stapleford Town's General Secretary (Jason Cockerham) gives his thoughts on last season, the club and what's next for the progression on and off the field..

From a club perspective how did you find the previous season?

'Firstly I must say congratulations to all at Southwell City, they really went for it in 21/22 not only on the pitch but off it as well, the facilities out at Brinkley are excellent and will only improve. We have always enjoyed great games against them and hopefully we will be able to join them in Step 6 soon. I know our management team was looking for promotion last season but we just fell a little short. Tris (Whitman), Danny (Arnold) and Jordan (Hunter) have been excellent all season and our playing style is improving all the time.'

Is promotion the plan for the future?

'Sure, at some point, 21/22 was never a promotion or bust season from the committee, the seniors management thought they could do it so we backed them, after the effects on the club during the covid pandemic the management were only ever set a task to impose a style of play at the club that could be filtered down through the squads so anyone who makes the step into the first team squad can do so knowing exactly what is expected of them. They have done that as well as bringing some of the younger lads out from the Reserves and giving them a chance to shine, which they have.'

What were your thoughts about returning to Hickings Lane.?

'Alan (Ure) at Borrowash Vics was a brilliant host and we thank him for all his help, we needed a ground share so that if we managed to get promoted we could. After we just missed out we decided that expense could be best used improving our own facilities. Added to that we wanted to bring the team back to the town, get supporters down and get the lads playing in front of a decent crowd (hopefully).'

Two hands, two feet and 100 jobs!

Can you get promoted from Hickings Lane?

'Unfortunately not under its current configuration, there are certain requirements that step 6 sides have to attain which we don't have or can't achieve, we are in advanced talks with Broxtowe Borough Council about regenerating the pitches and hope to bring news on that soon.'

Is that part of the Town improvement program?

'No, the club does not benefit directly from the TIP, our main benefit will be visitor experience with a new pavilion and cafe area. The club is operating outside the scope of the TIP and we make this very clear so as to cause no confusion. Our funding comes from within the club in the form of fundraising activities and utilisation of grants. We are also very lucky with sponsors who generously contribute each year. The club is only involved in the TIP as part of the plan is on ground we currently lease from Broxtowe Borough Council, although detrimental to the club (as the club will lose pitches during the work) we went to the initial meeting with the plan of creating a community hub so we are not just part of the community but the heart of the community'

Are you looking forward to the season?

'Yes, the squad has had a good preseason, some new faces have arrived and it's been well organised with very few last minute changes. I am looking forward to seeing some familiar faces again and welcoming some new ones to Hickings Lane'



Non League Round Up.

The United Counties Premier would see Newark & Sherwood held to a goalless draw at Deeping Rangers, whilst there was defeat for Sherwood Colliery, Selston, and Kimberley Miners Welfare, whilst in Division One there was victory for Newark (1-0 home to Barrow), a goalless draw in the derby between Hucknall and Rainworth, and a 2-2 draw for Gedling at Saffron Dynamo.

Bourne Town hit visiting Southwell City for five without reply, and Aylestone Park scored three when at Clifton All Whites, as did Birstall United when winning 3-1 at Dunkirk.

In the Northern Counties East, Ollerton Town moved within a point of local rivals Retford, when winning 1-0 at home to Champion, Jake Squires with the only goal of the game, from the spot, midway through the second period.

The Central Midlands League would see SJR Worksop win 2-1 at home to Hatfield Town, in the North, whilst in the South, Jake Ogden and Liam Black both bagged braces as Arnold Town won 5-2 away to South Normanton.

Nottingham won 1-0 at Derby Singh Brothers, Linby Colliery Welfare and Teversal both picked up a draw, against Mickleover Reserves and Holbrook St. Michaels respectively, and Mansfield Hosierey fell to a 3-1 defeat away to Cromford & Wirksworth.

Meanwhile, the Nottinghamshire Senior League Premier Division may be led by Wollaton, but they fell to a 3-0 defeat when home to fourth place Woodthorpe Park Rangers, and undefeated Stapleford Town, in sixth, picked up another win, 1-0 at home to Borrowash Victoria.

There was also games in the NSL Senior Cup as East Leake Robins won 3-1 on penalties (following a 1-1 draw) when away to Top Valley, Keyworth United won 4-1 at home to Clifton FCB, and Sandiacre Town won 3-1 against visitors AC United, Blair Anderson with a brace for the victors.

DIG IN COMMUNITY ALLOTMENT STAPLEFORD

February 2023 Newsletter

LAST MONTH AT DIG IN

We held our **WASSAIL** on Saturday 21st January and this year we had much nicer weather. Thank you to everyone who attended and thanked our fruit trees for last year's harvest and wished them well for the growing season ahead.

Special mention to Susanna for writing and performing a song about putting the garden to bed! Thanks to Pulp Friction for supplying us with cider & apple juice plus a veggie soup. The pumpkin soup was made by Karen from the last of our Dig In grown pumpkins.



COMING UP THIS MONTH

Karen will continue focusing on pruning our fruit trees and bushes and will be running informal training during our normal session for anyone who is interested. Our winter project of soil improvement to our beds is still ongoing, it hit a bit of a pause last month with frozen ground!

THRIFTY GARDENING TIPS

Start composting if you don't already do it, and keep your soil and plants happy. Three pallets can make a compost bay, or just have a traditional 'heap'. Aim for a 50:50 mix of dry 'brown' material and wetter 'greens' and keep filling up through the year. If you've not got space for a compost bin, make a home-made wormery for kitchen waste out of large pots or plastic boxes or even a big plastic bag! We will be hosting another workshop with Urban Worm so keep an eye out for that announcement.

KNOWING AND USING YOUR CROPS

This month we focus on **CHARD**, we have a number of plants currently growing in the polytunnel.



Chard or Swiss Chard is a member of the beet family, which is why their leaves look similar. Something to check out yourself! It is a popular choice for growing at the moment because it grows quickly and easily during the cooler temperatures of spring. Our seeds were sown

in September last year and planted in the polytunnel during our Twixmas session in December.

The whole of the plant can be eaten, both stalks and ribs and though it comes in a variety of colours green, white, red and a golden-orange there is very little taste difference between them. For a simple veggie side dish it is great to cook the chard in a little olive oil with some thinly sliced garlic and red pepper flakes. It is very interchangeable with any recipe which says spinach or kale so time to do some experimenting in your kitchen. There is a Bulgarian filo pie **ZELNIK** which uses feta, chard and spinach for a delicious savoury treat.

New Accommodation for Ex Service Personnel in Stapleford

Five new one bedroom homes have been completed for ex service personnel on the Council's housing register.

The flats were built by local firm, Vaughandale Construction Limited and have been built as part of the Council's Housing Delivery Plan.

The homes at Tom Martin House, have been named after the late Tom Martin who had been in Stapleford for only three months when war broke out. He enlisted in 1940 and went on to be awarded the French military decoration the 'Croix de Guerre'. He served throughout the Africa campaign from El Alamein to Sicily and went to France on the day following D-Day. He then served in Belgium and Holland and took part in the battle for Germany. Tom later returned to Stapleford, serving residents as local Broxtowe Councillor, Mayor for Stapleford and Broxtowe and then became an Honorary Alderman of Broxtowe Borough.

The new homes have secured a By Design rating of Gold for their safety and security and include off street parking and a secure, communal garden.

They also have good green credentials including showers rather than baths to aid in reducing water consumption, excellent insulation and are fitted with an air source heat pump and solar photovoltaic panels.

One of the new tenants said, "Moving in to one of the new flats has given me security and stability in relation to my disability and whether I may not be able to work in the future. I have moved around a lot and this flat now allows me to hope that this will be the last property I will live in and gives me that future where I can put my roots down. Living with other ex-service personnel has given it a family feel to living here."



Safety improvements at Hickings Lane Recreation Ground, Stapleford

Over the last 9 months Broxtowe Borough Council has been working very closely with Nottinghamshire Police to improve safety for visitors to Hickings Lane Recreation Ground in Stapleford. Following a successful bid to the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) in 2021, £25,000 was allocated by the PCC to provide new surveillance cameras, additional lighting and new fencing and gates on the park.

The new surveillance cameras have been installed adjacent to the play-area and skate park and monitor these areas including the pavilion and the multi-use games area. The cameras are panoramic with 360 degree views of the area. Fitted with infra-red vision they produce very high quality images, even when it is dark.

The new floodlights illuminate the play area, skate park and pavilion. They are all on timers so they come on at dusk and go off at midnight.

The final phase of the work was new fencing and gates at the West Cross

Avenue entrance. This is now locked at night and opened again in the morning by residents.

Overall the project has been a huge success and a very good advert for



partnership working. There has been a significant reduction in reports of anti-social behaviour and complaints about youths congregating on the park.



Working together to reduce crime

The South Nottinghamshire Community Safety Partnership continue to work hard to reduce crime across South Nottinghamshire. Measures used to reduce crime include amongst others, high-visibility policing, covert operations, CCTV surveillance and security patrols.

By raising awareness and increasing vigilance we can all help to reduce crime. During the spring and summer months many of us will be enjoying time away from home and spending time in our gardens - here are a few tips to keep you and your property safe when doing so

Before you go on holiday

- Make your home look lived in. Perhaps a trusted person could collect your post, cut your lawn and even park their car on your driveway.
- Avoid discussing forthcoming

holiday plans where strangers may hear details of your absence.

- Lock all doors and windows, if you have a burglar alarm set it!

In your garden

- Keep your shed in good condition, fittings should be bolted through the door and screws concealed, fit a shed alarm.
- Well positioned external lighting is a good way to deter intruders.
- Keep tools secure, they could be used to force entry into your home.
- Chain large items together and consider relocating valuable items to within your home.
- Mark your valuables with your postcode, house name or number.

Whatever the season there are steps all of us can take to help reduce our chance of becoming victims of crime

At home

- Fit and use good quality locks on doors and windows.
- Keep keys away from windows and doors.
- Remember, if you can get into your home without your keys, so can a burglar.

Your vehicle

- Never leave your vehicle insecure.

“What's Going on?”

This is a regular question at the club these last few weeks, what is causing such consternation you might ask? Well, the issue we have is that we have 11 Saturdays left of the season and we have only managed 13 league games in all that time. How is this possible? is another phrase often said, well the truth is we don't know. It's not been through the lack of trying, Paul (Harrison) and I have been feverishly working with the league to get games on, at one point calling the League Secretary and asking for a personal meeting. It felt like it helped but we still had the game a week later called off.

You may be thinking well there is still 11 weeks to go but herein lies the issue, currently the club is still in a cup competition so there is a potential of a further game to add to our rapidly congesting schedule. Add that to the 20 we already have. We now have 21 games in 11 weeks meaning we are playing twice a week from now until the end of the season, This situation could and should have been much much simpler, we did not play for a month in October and when the pitch was in the best condition it has been in for a few years, we could easily have hosted evening games in the August and September sunshine to alleviate the inevitable fixture pile up when the weather has hit and pitches across the Country become waterlogged or frozen.

So the real question is, how has this happened? That is down to a number of factors, heavy rain at the end of October postponed 1 fixture with the home side calling the pitch off, contractors had a factor in one where they failed to honour contractual obligations and left the pitch unmarked and unplayable, unavailability of officials (which led to the league allowing teams to cancel games?) another and the untimely passing of HRH Queen Elizabeth II saw all fixtures in the country postponed. Through all these challenges the club has constantly worked with the league to try and rearrange games and get lads onto the grass. All to no avail.

So the new question is, "how are we going to fit them in?"

I think I have already supplied the only available solution.

Radcliffe Olympic



"The club was established in 1876 making it one of the oldest football Clubs in the local area and joined the Notts Alliance, which they won in 1900/01. In the 1931/32 they won Division Two, as well as the South Notts League. In 1946/47 they won Division One of the Notts Realm League and the Division One Cup.

In a six-year period between the 1965/66 and 1970/71 seasons Olympic won three Midlands Amateur Alliance League titles, the Central Alliance Premier Division, the East Midlands Regional League Division One and the Midlands Amateur Alliance Senior Cup in the 1967/88 season.

In 1990/91 they won Division One of the Notts Alliance to earn promotion to the Senior Division, but were relegated back to Division One in 1992/93. They were relegated again in 1995/96, but were promoted back to Division One at the first attempt after finishing second in Division Two. In 2000/01 they finished second in Division One to return to the Senior Division.

In the summer of 2003 Radcliffe Olympic amalgamated with local club ASC Dayncourt to create one of the largest clubs in Nottinghamshire with it retaining the famous Radcliffe Olympic name. The club created four sections the Seniors, Intermediates, Juniors and Ladies to provided equal opportunities for everyone to play football.

The club were promoted to the Premier Division of the Central Midlands League, which they won at the first attempt in 2003/04, earning promotion to the Supreme Division. They won the Supreme Division in 2008/09, earning promotion to the new East Midlands Counties League.

The 2010/11 season was a historic moment as they made their debut in the FA Cup and played seven ties in five rounds before eventually being knocked out in the Third Round Qualifier.

The 2017/18 season saw them relegated from the EMC League. The 2018/19 season saw them relegated from the NSL Premier Division.

This season sees them play once again in the NSL Premier Division after winning the NSL Division 1 in 2021/22."
