

THE BLAIRGOWRIE JUNIOR FC CREST

The club name – simple and to the point.
Separate and distinct from a club of a similar name from the 1920s. . .

. . . and not to be confused with Blairgowrie United Junior FC who were founded in 1938 – but the outbreak of World War 2 in 1939 led to their demise. That team wore claret and amber and they failed to resume playing in 1945.

The club colours of blue, white and red. No one is sure why these colours were chosen!
Post-war patriotism?
Were they the colours of the original amateurs?



The old style football pays tribute to the club's founders – and the legacy left by many other clubs.

The year the club was founded. This arose from the wave of post-war optimism that swept Britain.
Blairgowrie Juniors were formed when the committee of the local amateur side decided to 'turn junior.'
After a series of friendlies, the first competitive match was against Kinnoull on the 24th August 1946 – 5-2 to Blair!

The crest is clearly split into two halves. This is similar to the coat of arms of the Burgh of Blairgowrie and Rattray.
As with the burgh coat of arms, the two halves represent Blairgowrie and Rattray, separated by the River Ercht.
Yet although separate halves, they come together to represent the joint community of Blairgowrie and Rattray, as well as the adjacent rural areas.
